The Clubs' Holiday Competition held on the 20th November 2013 was an opportunity for Members to show what they had been doing with their camcorders during the summer months. Many of the 25 Members who came along also seized the opportunity to join in the spirit of the evening by wearing a wide variety of clothing worn on their holidays. Indeed summer was really on display with Hawaiian shirts, colourful skirts and shorts (Albeit worn over thermals no doubt). Panama hats, straw bonnets along with sunglasses, sunshades and garlands aplenty as you see on the cover or this magazine. There was even the traditional knotted handkerchief with rolled up trousers and sandals for the day at the seaside with bucket and spade. (Sadly no-one brought the deck chair.) There was one attire which brought a measure of real class to the occasion. I refer of course to the black dinner suit and bow tie for those evenings at the Captains Table while cruising the high seas. Well done everyone.

The Chairman, Clive Hand, reminded folk of the next meeting which was the 'The Infamous Christmas Quiz'. It is scheduled for the 4<sup>th</sup> December and is the last before Xmas. Keith Baker would run the event with the usual high quality (joke) prizes being given away at its conclusion. The Judges for the Holiday competition were then introduced. They were Jacqueline Clarke, Michael Rice and Clive himself. The necessary machinery for the screening would be operated throughout by Mike Knock and Mike Pepper.

Our Comp. Sec. Keith Baker informed everyone that there were 7 Films with a running time of just over 1 Hour. There would be a short interlude between each showing to allow the Judges sufficient time to consider their thoughts.

The First film to be shown was 'A Taste of Edinburgh'. By Geoffrey Claridge. As the title suggests it was a visit to the Capital of Scotland showing the new and old districts of the City. The Castle featured as would be expected as was a visit to see the Royal Yacht .An interesting visit to a Tartan Factory was included with a humorous fashion parade.

The second entry was 'The Elloosive Moose' by Chris and Judith Kenny. This film was a journey through Massachusetts and New Hampshire in search of the Moose which, as the title points out, proved impossible to find and film. Despite this we were treated throughout to a

cartoon drawing of a Moose superimposed in many scenes. As and when they appeared it might well have prompted one to call out 'It's behind you". During the film we also experienced the wonderful sight of three hump back whales at play which obviously proved them to be much less illusive than the Moose. A truly delightful entry with a nice touch of nostalgia with an insert of Henry Fonda and Katharine Hepburn in the film 'The Golden Pond'. That film of course shot in New Hampshire.

The next up was '*Up and Away.'* Discovering Avignon by Geoffrey Claridge. This production was a short, in depth film of the city of Palias des Papes on the banks of the river Rhone in Southern France. It was indeed a narration of history which was both fascinating and informative.

The fourth entry was 
'Warnemünde by Keith Baker. This was a short film of a visit to the German Cruise Port and important seaside resort of Warnemuünde on the Baltic coast. It featured the old and new parts of the town with the many restaurants, pubs, souvenir shops and fishing vessels along both sides of the old waterway. The Lighthouse and famous Teepot also featured in this very busy atmosphere. A cameo appearance of the producer indulging in eating the local offerings was a shot to behold.

Film Five was another entry by Geoffrey Claridge entitled `High and Over', Memories of Provence. It was his visit to the enchanting Village of Gordes perched high upon a rocky outcrop. It was a very long and steep climb to the village square

but once there the beauty of the place made the effort well worth-while. Its quaint narrow streets and fortifications were a fascinating feature and the views from the top over the valley below were stunning. The narration of the history again given by Geoffrey was most informative.

The 6<sup>th</sup> entry was by Judith and Chris Kenny entitled '*Images'* which centred on the village of Lacock and its Abbey in rural Wiltshire. The area is owned by the National Trust and it is renowned for its picturesque streets and historical houses. Time was spent at the museum featuring William Fox Taylor, famous for his inventions in the art of photography. The village has often been the setting for period productions for both film and television. A very interesting step back in time.

Film Seven was the 3<sup>rd</sup> entry by Geoffrey Claridge entitled '*Under and Over'*. Filmed around Pont du Gard in the Provence Region of Southern France. It centred on the use of the Old Water Mill for the production of paper from wood pulp in the traditional way. It also featured splendid views of a magnificent Roman Viaduct over the river Gardon. This structure was built of huge arches and consisted of three levels . It is a world heritage site and as usual the narration was extremely informative.

There were of course generous applause of appreciation from all present at the end of each film shown.

During the refreshment break it was clear that the Judges were engaged in earnest discussion about their individual assessments. and the choices that had to be made in finding a winner. Not a task envied by many I suspect as it must have surely been very difficult.

With everyone refreshed and sitting comfortably it was time for the results of the competition to be announced. Clive began by congratulating those who had entered and acknowledged that the standard throughout had been extremely high. In fact he thought that the high level of production was almost identical in every film which made their deliberations rather lengthy.

Because of these factors he again emphasised the difficulty the judges had in making their decision. However, the final selection had been made and the end result proved unanimous

A suitable loud drum roll was made before each announcement was given. They were as follows:-
